Phylisa Carter is an attorney with seventeen years of experience. Her areas of practice have included housing law, community organizing, and criminal justice issues. Her areas of practice align with her intention to address community challenges.

Ms. Carter served on the board of the D.C. Corrections Information Council (CIC) for three years. As a CIC board member, she traveled to federal prisons and jails to interview correctional staff and inmates about prison conditions. These evaluations were used to write invaluable reports provided to government officials, advocates and the public. Additionally, the data from these reports informed criminal justice public policy discussions at the local level.

Ms. Carter has also worked as a Senior Staff Attorney at Bread for the City's Legal Clinic in Washington, DC with the Community Lawyering Project. During her seven years at Bread for the City, Ms. Carter worked closely with lawyers, organizers and community stakeholders to address individual and systemic issues that affect neighbors east of the Anacostia River.
