A BILL

- To establish the Route 66 Centennial Commission, to direct the Secretary of Transportation to prepare a plan on the preservation needs of Route 66, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 This Act may be cited as the "Route 66 Centennial
 - 5 Commission Act".
 - 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
 - 7 Congress makes the following findings:

(1) Route 66 was the Nation's first all-paved
 highway under the U.S. Highway System connecting
 the Midwest to California and has played a major
 role in the history of the United States.

5 (2) Route 66 was the symbol of opportunity to
6 hundreds of thousands of people seeking escape from
7 the Dust Bowl in the 1930s, serving as a "road to
8 opportunity" in the West and providing employment
9 during the Great Depression, as thousands were put
10 to work on road crews to pave the road.

(3) Route 66 was invaluable in transporting
troops, equipment, and supplies across the country
to the West, where the government established multiple industries and armed force bases during World
War II. Upon the conclusion of the war in 1945,
Route 66 was a key route taken by thousands of
troops as they returned home.

18 (4) Route 66 symbolized the Nation's positive 19 outlook during the postwar economic recovery in the 20 1950s and 1960s, serving as an icon of free-spirited 21 independence and linking people across the United 22 States. During this period, the tourist industry 23 along Route 66 grew tremendously, giving rise to 24 countless tourist courts, motels, service stations, ga-25 rages, and diners.

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(5) Since June 27, 1985, when Route 66 was
 decommissioned as a Federal highway, the popu larity and mythical stature of Route 66 has grown
 domestically and internationally, as the road has experienced a rebirth of interest and support.

6 (6) The year 2026 will be the centennial anni-7 versary of Route 66, and a commission should be es-8 tablished to study and recommend to Congress ac-9 tivities that are fitting and proper to celebrate that 10 anniversary in a manner that appropriately honors 11 America's Mother Road.

12 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT.

There is established a commission to be known as the
Route 66 Centennial Commission (referred to in this Act
as the "Commission").

16 SEC. 4. DUTIES.

17 The Commission shall have the following duties:

(1) To study activities that may be carried out
by the Federal Government to determine whether
the activities are fitting and proper to honor Route
66 on the occasion of its centennial anniversary, including any of the activities described under section
8(b)(2)(B).

24 (2) To recommend to Congress the activities25 the Commission considers most fitting and proper to

honor Route 66 on such occasion, to be carried out
 by the Department of Transportation and any other
 entity or entities within the Federal Government
 that the Commission considers most appropriate to
 carry out such activities.

6 (3) To plan and host, in cooperation with such
7 partners, a conference on the U.S. Numbered High8 way System, and assist in the activities of such a
9 conference.

10 SEC. 5. MEMBERSHIP.

(a) NUMBER AND APPOINTMENT.—The Commission
shall be composed of 19 members appointed as follows:
(1) Three members, each of whom shall be a

qualified citizen described in subsection (b), ap-pointed by the President.

16 (2) Two members, each of whom shall be a
17 qualified citizen described in subsection (b), ap18 pointed by the President on the recommendation of
19 the Secretary of Transportation.

20 (3) One member, who shall be a qualified cit21 izen described in subsection (b), appointed by the
22 President on the recommendation of the Governor of
23 Illinois.

24 (4) One member, who shall be a qualified cit-25 izen described in subsection (b), appointed by the

President on the recommendation of the Governor of

2	Missouri.
3	(5) One member, who shall be a qualified cit-
4	izen described in subsection (b), appointed by the
5	President on the recommendation of the Governor of
6	Kansas.
7	(6) One member, who shall be a qualified cit-
8	izen described in subsection (b), appointed by the
9	President on the recommendation of the Governor of
10	Oklahoma.
11	(7) One member, who shall be a qualified cit-
12	izen described in subsection (b), appointed by the
13	President on the recommendation of the Governor of
14	Texas.
15	(8) One member, who shall be a qualified cit-
16	izen described in subsection (b), appointed by the
17	President on the recommendation of the Governor of
18	New Mexico.
19	(9) One member, who shall be a qualified cit-
20	izen described in subsection (b), appointed by the
21	President on the recommendation of the Governor of

22 Arizona.

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(10) One member, who shall be a qualified cit-izen described in subsection (b), appointed by the

President on the recommendation of the Governor of
 California.

3 (11) Three members, each of whom shall be a
4 qualified citizen described in subsection (b), ap5 pointed by the President on the recommendation of
6 the Speaker of the House of Representatives, in con7 sultation with the minority leader of the House of
8 Representatives.

9 (12) Three members, each of whom shall be a 10 qualified citizen described in subsection (b), ap-11 pointed by the President on the recommendation of 12 the majority leader of the Senate, in consultation 13 with the minority leader of the Senate.

(b) QUALIFIED CITIZEN.—A qualified citizen described in this subsection is a private citizen of the United
States with—

17 (1) a demonstrated dedication to educating oth18 ers about the importance of historical figures and
19 events; and

20 (2) substantial knowledge and appreciation of21 Route 66.

(c) TIME OF APPOINTMENT.—Each initial appointment of a member of the Commission shall be made before
the expiration of the 120-day period beginning on the date
of the enactment of this Act.

1 (d) CONTINUATION OF MEMBERSHIP.—If a member 2 of the Commission was appointed to the Commission as 3 a Member of Congress, and ceases to be a Member of Con-4 gress, that member may continue to serve on the Commis-5 sion for not longer than the 30-day period beginning on the date that member ceases to be a Member of Congress. 6 7 (e) TERMS.—Each member shall be appointed for the 8 life of the Commission.

9 (f) VACANCIES.—A vacancy in the Commission shall 10 not affect the powers of the Commission but shall be filled 11 in the manner in which the original appointment was 12 made.

(g) BASIC PAY.—Members shall serve on the Com-mission without pay.

(h) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—Each member shall receive
travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence,
in accordance with sections 5702 and 5703 of title 5,
United States Code.

(i) QUORUM.—Seven members of the Commissionshall constitute a quorum but a lesser number may holdhearings.

(j) CHAIR.—The President, in consultation with the
Secretary of Transportation, shall designate one member
of the Commission as Chair.

1 (k) MEETINGS.—The Commission shall meet at the2 call of the Chair.

3 SEC. 6. DIRECTOR AND STAFF.

4 (a) DIRECTOR.—The Commission may appoint and
5 fix the pay of a Director and such additional personnel
6 as the Commission considers to be appropriate.

7 (b) APPLICABILITY OF CERTAIN CIVIL SERVICE8 LAWS.—

9 (1) DIRECTOR.—The Director of the Commis-10 sion may be appointed without regard to the provi-11 sions of title 5, United States Code, governing ap-12 pointments in the competitive service, and may be 13 paid without regard to the provisions of chapter 51 14 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of that title relat-15 ing to classification and General Schedule pay rates.

16 (2) STAFF.—The staff of the Commission shall
17 be appointed subject to the provisions of title 5,
18 United States Code, governing appointments in the
19 competitive service, and shall be paid in accordance
20 with the provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter III
21 of chapter 53 of that title relating to classification
22 and General Schedule pay rates.

23 **SEC. 7. POWERS.**

(a) HEARINGS AND SESSIONS.—The Commission25 may, for the purpose of carrying out this Act, hold such

hearings, sit and act at such times and places, take such
 testimony, and receive such evidence as the Commission
 considers to be appropriate.

4 (b) POWERS OF MEMBERS AND AGENTS.—Any mem5 ber or agent of the Commission may, if authorized by the
6 Commission, take any action that the Commission is au7 thorized to take by this Act.

8 (c) OBTAINING OFFICIAL DATA.—The Commission 9 may secure directly from any department or agency of the 10 United States information necessary to enable the Com-11 mission to carry out this Act. Upon request of the Chair 12 of the Commission, the head of that department or agency 13 shall furnish that information to the Commission.

(d) MAILS.—The Commission may use the United
States mails in the same manner and under the same conditions as other departments and agencies of the United
States.

(e) ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT SERVICES.—Upon
the request of the Commission, the Administrator of General Services shall provide to the Commission, on a reimbursable basis, the administrative support services necessary for the Commission to carry out its responsibilities
under this Act.

1 SEC. 8. REPORTS.

2 (a) INTERIM REPORTS.—The Commission may sub3 mit to Congress such interim reports as the Commission
4 considers to be appropriate.

5 (b) Comprehensive Report.—

6 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 5 years after 7 the date of enactment of this Act, the Commission 8 shall submit to the President and Congress a report 9 incorporating specific recommendations for the com-10 memoration of the centennial of Route 66 and re-11 lated events.

12 (2) CONTENTS OF REPORT.—The report under
13 paragraph (1)—

(A) shall include recommendations for the
allocation of financial and administrative responsibility among the public and private authorities and organizations recommended for
participation by the Commission; and

19 (B) may recommend activities such as—

20 (i) the production, publication, and
21 distribution of books, pamphlets, films,
22 electronic publications, and other edu23 cational materials focusing on the history
24 and impact of Route 66 on the United
25 States and the world;

1	(ii) bibliographical and documentary
2	projects, publications, and electronic re-
3	sources;
4	(iii) conferences, convocations, lec-
5	tures, seminars, and other programs;
6	(iv) the development of programs by
7	and for libraries, museums, parks, and his-
8	toric sites, including national traveling ex-
9	hibitions;
10	(v) ceremonies and celebrations com-
11	memorating specific events;
12	(vi) the production, distribution, and
13	performance of artistic works, and of pro-
14	grams and activities, focusing on the na-
15	tional and international significance of
16	Route 66; and
17	(vii) the issuance of commemorative
18	coins, medals, certificates of recognition,
19	and postage stamps.
20	(c) FINAL REPORT.—The Commission shall submit
21	to the President and Congress a final report not later than
22	90 days before the termination of the Commission pro-
23	vided in section 10.

SEC. 9. PLAN ON PRESERVATION NEEDS OF ROUTE 66.

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Transportation,
3 in consultation with the Governors referred to in section
4 5(a), shall prepare a plan on the preservation needs of
5 Route 66.

6 (b) REPORT TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 3 years 7 after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall 8 submit to the Committee on Transportation and Infra-9 structure of the House of Representatives, the Committee 10 on Environment and Public Works of the Senate, and the 11 President a report containing the plan prepared under 12 subsection (a).

13 SEC. 10. BUDGET ACT COMPLIANCE.

Any spending authority provided under this Act shallbe effective only to such extent and in such amounts asare provided in appropriation Acts.

17 SEC. 11. TERMINATION.

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18 The Commission shall terminate not later than June19 30, 2027.

20 SEC. 12. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

21 There are authorized to be appropriated such sums22 as may be necessary to carry out this Act.
